WELCOME

Welcome to the 2nd Annual Home for Good in Oregon Re-entry Conference. With the theme “A Gathering of the Village” this conference will focus on community and faith-based partnerships and highlight emerging strategies that promote an effective re-entry process to ensure community safety and community justice.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Dr. Garry Mendez Jr., Executive Director and Founder of The National Trust for the Development of African American Men, will address issues surrounding ethnic minorities, prison and re-entry.

Dr. James Hyman, consultant and representative of the Annie E. Casey Foundation will discuss issues surrounding economic, youth and community development and prisoner re-entry related to minorities.

Mr. Junious Williams, CEO of Urban Strategies Council in Oakland California, will discuss faith-based community building.

Rev. Eugene Williams III, Executive Director of Los Angeles Metropolitan Churches, will address Faith-based Community Building.

Dr. Ed Latessa, Professor and Division Head of Criminal Justice at University of Cincinnati will discuss “What Works” in the field of re-entry.

WORKSHOPS

The conference workshops offer a mix of national and local speakers who are experts in their fields. They will discuss some of the most pressing issues related to re-entry and reintegration including employment, housing, methamphetamine and other drugs, and working with sex offenders. Workshops also include faith-based and community building, children of incarcerated parents and crime reduction through community dialogue.

COMMUNITY BUILDING IN OREGON

The goal of the HGO conference is to provide participants with practical and applicable skills and action strategies that can be replicated in local communities to build a network of support and participation from religious, business, neighborhood and ex-offender populations.

Attendees will have the opportunity to network with individuals involved in re-entry both inside and outside their community and establish local re-entry partnerships to facilitate and support an effective re-entry process with community.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Religious leaders, faith-based organizations, treatment providers, transitional housing providers, law enforcement, community agencies, ex-offenders, corrections professionals, non-profits, community corrections, churches, media, employers, veterans’ groups, educators and anyone concerned or involved with the re-entry and reintegration of individuals leaving prison.

There is increasing collaboration today across the work of a wide variety of state and local agencies.
